## UNODC Launches Survey on Legal Aid and Discrimination

The United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime (UNODC) has launched a first-of-its-kind survey to gather data on how discrimination, particularly related to race or minority status, may impact practices of legal aid systems worldwide. The analysis will highlight the often-invisible experiences of individuals who face intersectional discrimination within criminal justice systems. The collected responses will play a crucial role in supporting UNODC's efforts to address these issues



## World Food Program: A New Brief on School Meals' Impact

In partnership with the World Bank, the World Food Programme has launched the School-based Programmers Impact Evaluation Window to promote health, learning, and human capital development. This brief highlights findings from evaluations in The Gambia, Jordan, Burundi, Guatemala, and Malawi, revealing that school meals not only enhance children's food security but also stimulate local economies by creating opportunities for workers and local farmers.
